

Introduction of HousingFirst Lab


Executive summary



- Homelessness in the United States is far from being solved. There are more than 550,000 individuals in America experiencing homelessness every year. At least 5,755 people in Denver experienced homelessness in 2018, an 8% increase from the previous year
- Housing First is an evidence-based solution to homelessness, with strong housing retention outcomes; many non-profits across Denver are already serving clients using Housing First models
- However, service providers are facing significant barriers:
 - Not enough resources are deployed to evidence-based solutions: there is a shortage of affordable housing, insufficient federal housing subsidies, and an under-involved private sector
 - Barriers to implementation exist for service providers: inefficient organizational processes, lack of model fidelity, and restrictive funding
- HousingFirst Lab unites resources, talent, and knowledge across sectors to end homelessness, by identifying organizational barriers limiting homelessness and housing agency outcomes, and connecting those agencies to the best private sector resources available
- One of our first solution offerings will be a **professional fellowship program** which embeds skilled business professionals with service providers for 4 12 month impact-based projects to improve service delivery and outcomes
- HousingFirst Lab will rapidly expand programs and locations over the next 5 years, providing executive workshops, a
 knowledge sharing platform, pro-bono resources, an implementation fund, and affordable housing investment
- We are looking to **fund our first year of operations**, which includes a pilot program placing 3 fellows with Denver service providers










60+ conversations with service providers revealed several opportunities to expand and deepen their impact













Strategic planning

Limited time, space, capacity, and support to think strategically about impact and organization

Create formal and ongoing opportunities for strategic conversations



Program inconsistency and inefficiency leads to staff burn-out and difficulty analyzing program-level outcomes

Identify areas of inconsistent and/or inefficient operations and implement solutions

Unlocking the value of data

Complex data entry requires significant staff time without demonstrating value to the population served or the organization itself

Simplify data tracking systems and develop analytical insights that communicate impact to funders and inform internal operating decisions

Program innovation

Scarce time or resources to analyze program performance, and scarce flexible funds to modify program parameters

Identify and implement opportunities for new programs or modifications to best serve clients and increase impact

Simplify & expand funding streams

Restricted funds, intricate grant applications, and donor-required metrics create financial and operational complexity

De-duplicate metrics tracked, allocate restricted funds effectively, and identify and pursue untapped funding streams

Unite resources, talent, and knowledge across sectors to end homelessness

Knowledge sharing

Develop housing / homelessspecific organizational IP. Amplify learnings and best practices.

Direct resource collaboration

Connect housing / homeless agencies to private-sector resources. Educate and engage private sector individuals to become lifelong supporters of homeless housing and services.

Financial investment

Supplement under-investment in organizational effectiveness.
Pursue incremental private sector investment for affordable housing.

Improve organizational effectiveness and the social impact value of every dollar donated

Connect additional private sector resources and capital to solving homelessness

Meaningfully reduce the number of individuals experiencing homelessness in America

Solution offerings: Six options for private sector resources to collaborate with homeless and housing agencies



Knowledge sharing

Knowledge sharing platform

Database of previous engagements and outcomes; published articles, presentations, and peer experience sharing

Skilled volunteer & pro bono resources network

Extensive network of collaborative private sector companies in relative fields (e.g., legal, healthcare, real estate, etc.)

Direct resource collaboration

Professional fellowship program

Short-term placement of 1-2 experienced business professionals on projects with direct opportunity for increased impact

Executive leadership workshops

Annual internal sessions with corporate executive or consulting partner to discuss and refine high-level strategy

Financial investment

Implementation fund

Flexible funds to be allocated to client agencies with a demonstrated opportunity for improved organizational effectiveness

Affordable housing investments

Direct contributions and low-interest investments to increase affordable housing supply in high-cost communities

Delores Project

Organization

- Housing and shelter provider for individuals experiencing homelessness
- Runs Arroyo Village supportive housing





Project

- Analyze and set-up Medicaid billing for supportive services
- Understand financial trade-offs and implementation requirements

Impact

- Additional health services provided to 35 families and through Medicaid funding
- Improved health outcomes for long-term residents

Bayaud Enterprises

Organization

- Social enterprise employment programs
- Employs current or recently homeless individuals





Project

- Determine pricing and business model for new apartment renovation business
- Achieve financial sustainability

Impact

- ~30+ additional individuals employed through new business unit
- Improved housing retention and economic selfsufficiency

Solution offerings: Executive Workshops & Knowledge Sharing Platform



Executive Workshops

Description

- Annual sessions between nonprofit organization and management consulting partner/ business executive
- Discuss and refine high-level strategy and operations



Impact

- Opportunity for outside advice on organizational strategy and operations questions
- Strategy review to improve operational effectiveness and service delivery outcomes

Knowledge Sharing Platform

Description

- Collection of previous engagements and outcomes on accessible platform
- Published articles, presentations, and peer experience sharing through existing forums when possible




Impact

HFL introduces private sector resources worth 2-3x its operating budget to be deployed against homelessness






^{*}Estimated market-rate value of skilled labor and other in-kind support generated from first year of HousingFirst Lab operations

We are raising ~\$300K for our first year of operations; any contribution is appreciated


